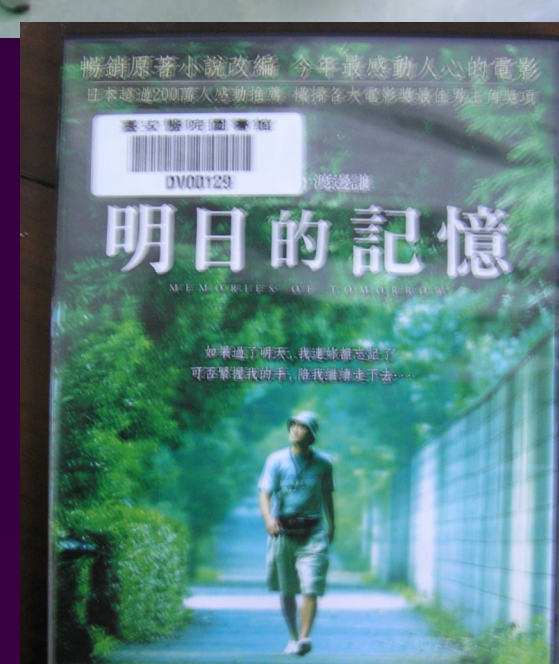


# HEALTHCARE INSIDE AND OUTSIDE MOVIES, DIALOGUES BETWEEN HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS

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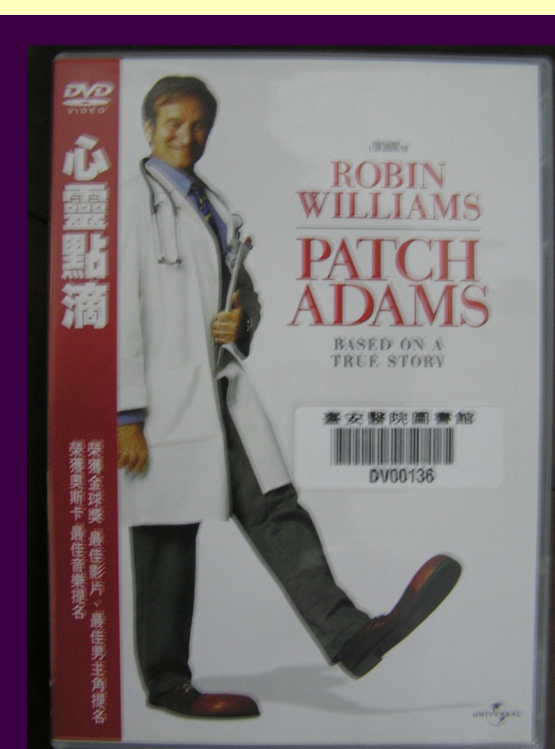
## INTRODUCTION

Since heavy work loadings and uncommon working time, less healthcare workforces will like to get new healthcare information actively. In the other hand, language is a gap for the healthcare workforces in Taiwan except physicians to know what new in other countries' healthcare technology and strategy. We designed a kind of activity for the healthcare workforces in our hospital to break throw these limits.



## METHODS

Participators were provided a movie which talking some medical subjects and they watched it before the activity. A specialist was invited to lead the discussion. The feedbacks and opinions of participators were collected via questionnaire survey. 80 questionnaires were sent and 62 valid questionnaires were returned.



## STORY

The Japanese movie "Memories of Tomorrow" was talking about Alzheimer's disease. A nurse sobbed out her story after many information and ideas shared. Her family didn't suspect that her father had AD until whom becoming very serious. They were always impatient and angry with the old man. Then they didn't know how to care him and where to get supports. Her father was passed two months ago. She wished she could get these information earlier.



## CONCLUSION

The investigation shows movie is indeed the main attraction to participators. They become interesting in different healthcare technology in foreign countries and the language gap seems disappeared via movies. Sharing knowledge and strategies inspires them in their job. In addition, they know more supporting resources from government and social welfare institution. 82% participators consider the information they gained from the activity would facilitate their clinical healthcare. 77 % participators joined at least twice.
